We continue our study and dialogue with the sources of Jesuit thought and its socio-historical achievements in the modern era. The attention to this doctrinal and civilizational context places us in the complex crossroads between European and American cultures and societies during the 16th to 18th centuries where the way of configuring the interaction between diverse and unequal subjects and societies in terms of recognition and power is at stake. The study of Jesuit works and institutional praxis will allow us to see their distinctiveness and contribution to coexistence in the disputes over the models of globalization and normative articulation in the global society of the modern era, as well as their significance in facing the challenges of a cosmopolitan justice in our days.

In turn, access to the sources of the works of Jesuit thinkers, such as Francisco Suárez, among others, allows us to dialogue with contemporary currents and challenges for the configuration of the ethical dimension of subjects and societies. The correlation between a certain metaphysical understanding of the human being and its ethical dimension in the context of Christian and humanist thought of the Jesuit tradition requires us to ask ourselves about its pertinence and relevance in current ethical and cultural debates.

We will use Spanish or English for the speeches and presentations.

We suggest the following thematic lines for discussion:

- 1. Historical outlines of intercultural dialogues: communication, critique of injustices, cultural and religious translations in the first modernity.**
- 2. Cosmopolitan justice and reconstruction of a Law for Humanity: Iberian School of Peace, Ibero-American Tradition of human rights and contemporary challenges.**
- 3. Are we facing a "post-metaphysical" era? Readings on the possible contribution of Christian and Jesuit thought to philosophy and ethics today.**
- 4. Dialogues with the thought of Suarez from the moral treatises.**
